

## Prevention

Total estimated need .... \$85 m

#### Recommendation:

Increase funding to expand high-quality home visiting services to cover more families and children.

Total estimated need .... \$143 m

### Recommendation:

End the waiting list for child care assistance and restore services to families up to 200% of the poverty level.

Total estimated need .... \$121 m (for full-day)

#### Recommendation:

Expand NM Pre-K to a fullday program and fully fund it so high-quality pre-K is available to all 4-year-olds.
