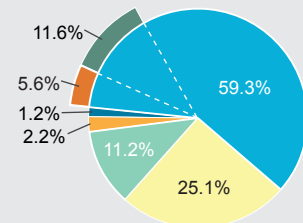
Child population (ages 0-19) by race and ethnicity* 2016

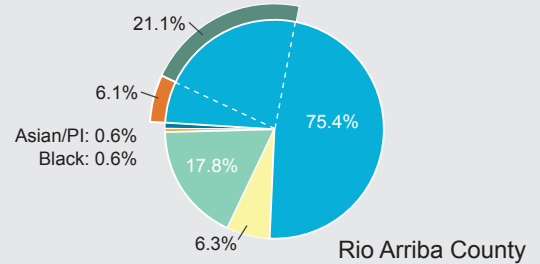

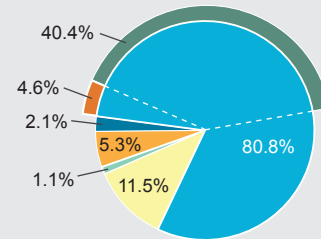

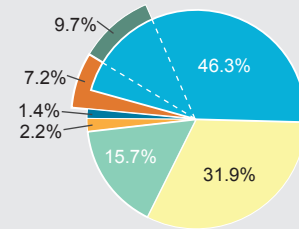

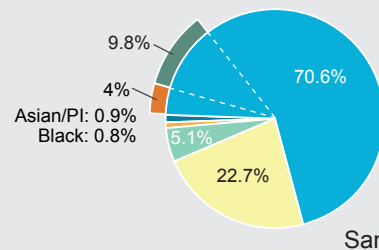

Total population (all ages) by race and ethnicity* 2016

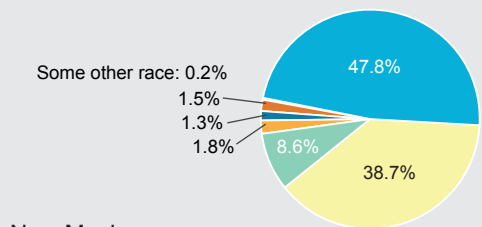

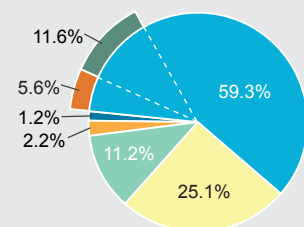
Child population (ages 0-19) by race and ethnicity* 2016

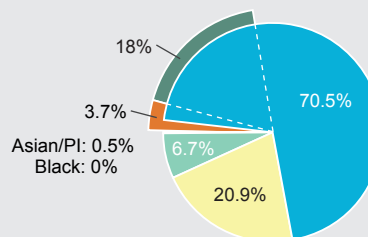

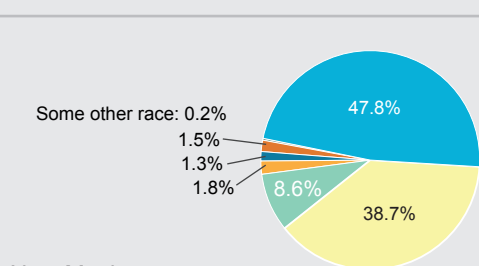

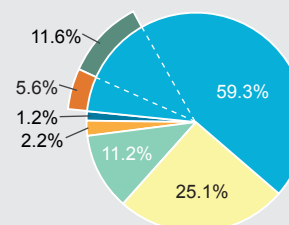
Child population (ages 0-19) by race and ethnicity* 2016
