American FactFinder

Census data access site (including for the American Community Survey data) with numerous demographics, health, education, community, and economic well-being data sets that can be accessed nationally, regionally, or by state, county, city, school district, MSA, legislative district etc. Data sets include ones focused on housing, race and ethnicity, family and living arrangements, transportation, language, employment, income, poverty, businesses, disability status, veterans, geography and more.

For Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Las Cruces, and Rio Rancho, the website compiles social and economic factors (poverty, violent crime, housing cost, neighborhood racial/ethnic segregation etc.), physical environment

(park access, walkability, air pollution, limited access to healthy food, lead exposure etc.), health behavior (smoking, physical inactivity, binge drinking etc.), health outcomes (obesity, diabetes, opioid overdose death...), and clinical care (dental care, prenatal care, preventive services etc.).

NM Youth Risk & Resiliency Survey (YRRS)

Survey data on NM high school and middle school students’ behaviors to assess the health risk behaviors and resiliency (or protective) factors of school students. Indicators include risky behaviors (related to alcohol and drug use, unintentional injury, violence, suicidal ideation and attempts, tobacco use, sexual activity, physical activity, and nutrition) and protective factors (such as relationships in the family, school, community, and with peers; and health status issues such as body weight and asthma.)
